Introduction and Course Description

Managing Information Technology is the first in a series of courses you can take to develop your background in the use of technology in business. This course is introductory and therefore will deal with the basics in several areas of information systems and management. If, upon completion of this course, you want to extend your education in this area, you can look into college programs related to management information systems. This course is designed to provide the basic, introductory background knowledge necessary for MBA students to understand information technology—how information systems are identified, initiated, analyzed, designed, developed, and implemented; and how businesses and industries procure, use, and manage such systems. My belief is that we are all technologists.

Weekly Assignments	25%	There are 7 individual assignments. Each will contribute equally to the grade.
Weekly Discussions	25%	There are 8 discussion activities (7 Modules plus the Introduction post). Each will contribute equally to the grade.
Weekly Chapter Quizzes	15%	During the first 6 weeks, you will have a weekly quiz based on the readings. You can take the quiz up to 3 times. Your highest score will be graded. Each quiz will include a random set of questions and include true-false, multiple choice, and fill in the blank.
Reflection Application Paper	15%	This final reflection application paper will have you both reflect on your learning and offer specific application of the course material to your career.
Final Exam	20%	This final exam will allow you to show your knowledge and understanding of the material by providing answers to approximately 10 long-answer questions.
